
### YOUNG BUCKS 14 OVER-FORTIES 7

The Young Buck gridders survived a Thanksgiving feast, a wild bingo party and a scare from a gutty Over Forty squad last year to win the much publicized and controversial Turkey Bowl. The feast and party were all part of the homecoming festivities at Nicolls Stadium but the scare on the gridiron was not expected by most Young Buck players, fans, sportswriters and concession stand workers.

After a brief picture session and some pregame activities the anticipation was over as the Young Bucks won the coin toss and received the opening kickoff. The Over Forties promptly held the Young Bucks on downs and then drove to within ten yards of paydirt on their first possession. The drive was led by "Big Don" Nicolls at the helm and included completions to "Crazy Legs" Lewis and "Hammerin Hank" Grover but when his fifth down pass fell incomplete in the corner of the end zone the Bucks defence breathed a sigh of relief. The rest of the first quarter was highlighted by a series of interceptions by "Jukin Joey" Stephan and "Hammerin Hank" Grover for the Forties squad and "Monsterman" Mark Hitchins and Dale "Too small" Nicolls for the Young Bucks.

The second quarter was packed with excitement from beginning to end as both teams scored to deadlock the contest at halftime. On the Bucks first possession of the quarter "Junk Yard" Grover hit Bob "Big Boy" Nicolls on a down out and down for a touchdown to give the Bucks an early second quarter lead. Shortly thereafter the Young Bucks drove to the one foot line after another interception by "Too small" only to be turned away by the brilliant play of the Forties at the goal line. The Bucks had run "Mad Dog" Grover on three consecutive plays and on fourth down and inches they chose to do the same but came up short as "Crazy Legs" made a diving tag to stop him. The Over Forties intercepted the Bucks on fifth down as "Dandy Dean" Kauffman came up with the pigskin to thwart the Bucks efforts. This defensive series seemed to motivate the offense of the Forties and after an interception late in

the quarter by "Hammerin Hank" they were able to sustain a scoring drive. On fifth down "Jukin Joey" completed a pass to "Hammerin Hank" in the corner of the end zone to tie the ball game and end the quarter on the most controversial play of the game.

The third quarter was a defensive struggle by both teams as neither the Bucks or Forties could move the ball. The Over Forties quarter-back "Jukin Joey" wished he had a place to hide as the line of "Mad Dog" and "Bubby" Bundy of the Bucks pressured him continually. The other side of the coin was about the same as the Bucks quarterbacks were swarmed upon by "Wild Bill" Nicolls and "Killer Kevin" Blucker forcing them out of their game plan.

The fourth and final quarter was highlighted by stingy defense on both sides of the ball and one BIG play. The Bucks "Junk Yard" again connected with "Big Boy" on a deep post pattern to go ahead to stay. The Forties were not about to give up and under "Big Don" were able to mount some late quarter drives but to no avail as the Bucks prevent defense prevailed. The memory of this game will live on for years to come as one of the most hard fought defensive struggles of the coveted Turkey Bowl both in mind and on videotape.
