On defense for the Young Bucks was Emilie "Buckeye" Ridge, Jamm'n Jake Grover, Jeffrey "Bulldog" Grover, Jonathan Speedy Bundy, Defender Joel Bundy and rookies E.J. Nicolls, Micah "Shoestring" Delo and last but not least, Nora "The Explorer" Teplan from Hungary. Level Headed Referee Hank Grover tossed the twoheaded coin and the Silver Bucks picked heads

and elected to receive.

2008 was another first in

the storied history of the Turkey Bowl. It was the first time the big game was broadcast in HD TV.

Both teams went fourand-out on their first possessions despite completions to "Cap'n Crunch" Kevin Blucker and Joshua "Attacker" Bundy for the Silvers and Defender Joel Bundy for the Youngs. The second possession for the Silvers was more promising. The Youngs could only manage one connection to Defender Joel Bundy and then they punted, pinning the Silvers on their own ten yard line. the Youngs went up 6 to nothing on
the Silvers.

The Silvers tried to respond with passes to "Cap'n Crunch" Kevin Blucker and "Wild" Bill Nicolls, but Micah "Shoestring" Delo intercepted the Silver 4th down pass in the end zone. That started a trend. The next two series were also thwarted by interceptions. One was by "Cap'n Crunch" Kevin Blucker and the other was by Jamm'n Jake Grover. On the last drive of the half, Jeffrey "Bulldog" Grover had two grabs. On the last play of the half the Silvers stopped the Youngs on the 10 yard line. The half ended with the Youngs

I've always felt so fortunate to have had them as Grandparents. They both worked so hard on the farm, yet were so enjoyable to be around. Grandma had a great personality, smile and laugh, and Grandpa had a great sense of humor. They, together, brought up ten (10) children – all of whom went on to lead very admirable lives. They were all so much like their parents!

When I was about 10 years old or so, it was my turn for a week's vacation on the farm with them. Grandma would take me outside with her to feed the chickens and pigs. That was fun! Then she'd go back inside the big kitchen, put some more wood into the stove, and cook up the biggest lunchtime meal I ever saw for Grandpa and Uncle Art to come in from working in the farm — huge slabs of ham, fried potatoes, etc.

Aunts Jen and Marge would take me outside to the "bathroom" at night before taking me by kerosene lamp up to one of the many bedrooms to go to bed.

One night, Grandma and Grandpa asked the girls to take me to Conneaut Lake Park to go swimming. That, too, was fun!

Saturday night was always "Grange" night. There would be music in the middle of downtown Conneautville. We walked around and everyone was so happy to see Harriet and Sylvester. Then it was on to the Grange Hall, where everyone came over to visit with them and they all danced to the music.

Their house was huge – 18 big rooms. On Christmas Day, Grandma would cook for about 20+ of her family and all of us from Poland. The farm was on 500 acres but was mostly a dairy farm, with 25-30 cows. These figures about the farm, acreage, cows, rooms, etc., have been corroborated by Aunt Jen on November 3, 2009.

We all felt very lucky to have had Harriet and Sylvester as "fun" grand-parents and looked forward to visiting them in Conneautville, and seeing them when they came out to Poland (but always had to get home to milk the cows), and also, when we all got together at Tucker's Cottage, or at the big pavilion at Lake Erie.

### Memories of Conneautville By Betty Grover

It was always so much fun. Jen and I had to sleep in the very last bedroom and there was a big water tank in there to catch the rainwater. It looked scary so Jen and I always kept the door closed by it so we didn't have to look at it.

Uncle Lee Earl said this little ditty while milking the cows:

Betty bump Teddy

Tail alago Teddy

Tregged, Tyerlegged

Bow-legged Betty

THEN... Squirt! He squirted milk in my face. To this day I will not drink milk.

Jen and I would take turns visiting each other. First I would go to the farm for a week, and then Jen would come to Poland. We would walk to the fire department to see Grandpa McCoy, the fire chief, and then stop at Grandma Minnie's. Aunt Jen said, however, she was never allowed inside Grandma Minnie's house, but waited outside while I visited with her.

We went to dances in town and stopped for ice cream before going back to the farm.

We were sitting on the front porch swing and Uncle Lee Earle came around the house and scared us so

badly that we fell off the porch. Both Jen and I loved the farm.

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#### Memories of Harriet and Sylvester By Gene Nicolls

Harriet and Sylvester were great grandparents. They didn't come to visit us often but we went to their house at the farm. Every summer I would spend two weeks during having time so I could help them in the fields to gather the hay. Uncle Art was only one year older than I and we played and worked together. Grandma would tell us to go get two chickens for dinner. I would run around chasing all the chickens until Art told me to chase one until it became tired. She would cook two chickens when my family was to be there for dinner.

One time Art and I were in the cornfield and met a skunk and it sprayed us. We ran back to the house with that terrible odor on us. Grandma was not happy; she ordered us into the tub and I don't remember what she did with our clothes.

Grandma was a good cook and kept the wood cook stove going most of the day. She prepared three big meals a day; plus washing the clothes and ironing. It was a big house to clean.

Grandpa sold milk in large cans to a local dairy. Each morning the cows had to be milked and the milk was poured into big cans. Then Grandpa went to the house for a big breakfast. He loaded about 5 milk cans onto a trailer and pulled it with his truck to town. He would turn off the engine at the top of the hill and coast down the hill; that was to save gas. I would ride to town with him. When he arrived at the dairy they removed the cans and then stood and talked for a while.

In the farm house they had a room that held a huge water tank that collected the rain water from the roof. They used it for dishes, washing clothes, and the bathroom. Their drinking water came from a well with a pump outside the kitchen door.

Grandma was a warm, loving person. She always had work to do. By the time I went to visit them most of the girls had married and left home. I only recall Aunt Jenny and Aunt Jerry still at home.

Grandpa had his son, Lee Earl to help him with the farm and Art could do some of the chores.

Every Saturday night we would go to town with Grandma and Grandpa to buy groceries and visit with friends. They always bought me an ice cream cone. In those days that was special since refrigerators did not have freezers.

One day Art and I were out in the field and Art put me on a horse without a saddle. This horse had a sore spot on his back and I was sitting on it. The horse took off heading for the barn as fast as he could go. Grandpa saw us coming and opened the gate so the horse could go into its stall with me still on his back. Grandpa was really mad at Art since Art knew about the horse's sore spot.

One night one of the two front doors opened and a "bear" came up the stairs and sat at the top of the stairs near the bedrooms. I was quite young at the time and Mom (Harriet) yelled to all the children to stay in their beds and keep the doors closed. Then Lee Earl somehow managed to get outside, find a ladder, put it up to the second floor window, crawl through with a big stool and throw it at the "bear" that fell down the steps and went out the front door. Then they shot it with their shotgun. Unfortunately, it wasn't a bear, but a neighbor's very expensive big dog.
